Below is an excerpt from the letter of support from her colleagues that helped **Lisa Nolan** become the Illinois Head Start Association's (IHSA) Teacher of the Year.

Lisa Nolan started at Riverbend Head Start and Family Services over six years ago, but has been an early childhood educator for over 30 years. She started her journey with the organization as a Teaching Assistant where she immediately excelled at enriching our student's lives and empowering families to better themselves. For the past year and a half, she has been working as a lead teacher in a part-day classroom. As well as her normal duties, Lisa is always willing to step up and help in any way she can such as providing a helping hand at parent's nights, leading summer programs, co-planning an amazing family reading night, and covering for other teaching staff without any hesitation.

Lisa Nolan received the Teacher of the Year Award during the IHSA's annual conference which was held in Springfield, Illinois, on Wednesday, March 13th.

"I was very surprised, I didn't expect it," says Nolan. "This is just what I do, and this is what I'm very passionate about. So, I was really surprised, I wasn't expecting it. I felt very humbled."

Nolan has devoted her life to being an educator. But she admits that receiving the award was a bittersweet moment. She got a little emotional while talking about her parents who laid the foundation for her.

"They were very proud," says Nolan. "Both of my parents have passed away and my Dad wanted one of us to be a teacher. I'm the only one that ended up being a teacher in the family, and this would make my Dad proud, so proud..."

The staff and students at Essic Robinson helped to celebrate the occasion. Alton's Mayor **David Goins** and Police Chief **Jarrett Ford** took time from their schedules to stop by Essic and help celebrate Nolan and her accomplishment. RHSFS Board Member **Monica Bristow** was also in attendance for the festivities.

For Nolan, the work continues – with each day offering something exceptional to be a part of.

"The best part of what I do is seeing my friends come in on a daily basis," she says. "I also love seeing the kids come into the classroom. I get to love on these kids and spend time and interact with them. I feel like I appreciate them for allowing me to be a part of their lives."

Administrator of the YEAR

Operations Director **Cathy Blevens** is a longtime employee of RHSFS. She began working for the agency on September 27, 1999.

Her various positions have included: Early Head Start Case Manager, Case Manager, Lead Case Manager, Family Engagement Specialist and now, Operations Director.

"I truly believe in the mission of the agency and absolutely love working with the parents," says Blevens. "When you believe in the mission it is really easy to enjoy coming to work each day."

Blevens enjoys seeing the growth in our parents as they work to support their children. It's rewarding to experience the parents through Policy Council. She says the interaction feeds her soul.

"I was lucky enough to encounter three families that I worked with over 20 years ago at what I would call a low time for me," she says. "Each one shared their story and reminisced about the impact the home visits had on them. We do not always know the impact we have on others, but when you get the chance to be reminded - it fuels you to keep focusing on our mission."

While there have been plenty of rewarding moments throughout the years, she admits the job is not without its share of challenges. But she tries to not sweat the small stuff, and keeps her focus on the bigger picture.

"The most challenging part of the job is balancing the schedule of what you intended to do, vs. what you end up doing," she says. "I have learned to expect the unexpected and what was important today, may not always be important tomorrow."



In addition to being recognized this year by the IHSA, Blevens says she's also proud of completing the UCLA Head Start Management Fellows Program in June 2017. The program is hosted through the John E. Anderson Graduate School of Management at UCLA. She says it was a "challenging, yet rewarding experience" and feels fortunate that she was able to participate in it.

As for the IHSA Administrator of the Year award, Blevens says that she is "truly humbled and honored" over being nominated.

"I know we have such an extraordinary group of people that work our mission every day, and without all of the staff here I cannot even begin to do my job," she says. "I feel this award is in recognition of the agency that I have been fortunate enough to work for."



"We were honored with the opportunity to be able to share our prenatal program with other programs across the state. This is always a great conference full of information and connecting with other Head Start staff."

Building Strong Foundations

The title of my presentation was - Building Strong Foundations: Nurturing Attachment and Utilizing Existing Tools for Challenging Behaviors.

I explored effective strategies for supporting positive behavior and social-emotional development in early childhood settings.

Key highlights included:

<u>Understanding Attachment</u>: I delved into the importance of caregiver-child attachment in shaping children's social-emotional development and behavior regulation, emphasizing the role of secure attachments in promoting resilience and well-being.

<u>Utilizing Existing Tools</u>: Participants learned about the value of utilizing tools and resources readily available in early childhood settings, such as visual schedules, picture cards, and social stories, to support positive behavior and address challenging behaviors effectively.

Strengths-Based Approach: We discussed the benefits of adopting a strengths-based approach, which focuses on identifying and leveraging children's unique strengths, talents, and interests to promote their overall well-being and resilience.

Collaborative Strategies: Collaboration between caregivers, educators, families, and other stakeholders was highlighted as essential for creating supportive environments and implementing effective behavior support interventions.

About 25 people attended my session comprised of Head Start parents, teachers, supervisors, and mental health providers.

Tie-Dye Fridays

The mini movement known as "Tie-Dye Fridays" was created by IT Specialist, **Karla Hurley**. She has proudly promoted the unofficial day since the start of the New Year. She enjoys seeing the support it's received. That includes support from our President & CEO.

"I thought that's kind of cool," says **Gene Howell**. "Knowing that Karla likes music and is a musician I figured this was tied to that."

Then, Howell said he learned the true meaning behind Tie-Dye Friday's through the January employee newsletter.

"Karla's idea, while subtle, is actually pretty profound," according to Howell. "When we think about a culture where everyone wants to feel seen, heard, and included – simple statements of broad inclusion can be hard to come by."

The next time you look at a tie-dye design, take a moment to notice all the colors of the various ribbons we wear to show support for causes that are close to our hearts. For example, we wear blue to bring awareness to child abuse prevention, pink elevates breast cancer awareness, yellow/white elevates bone cancer awareness, red elevates addiction awareness and green ribbons represent mental health awareness. The list goes on and on.

"As you can imagine, the individual challenges our staff carry within themselves goes on and on," says Howell. "Within our organization, we have mission partners and coworkers battling personal or family challenges every day."

To quote a cancer survivor in our midst, **Lisa McKee**, "no one should go through this alone." We may not know what a person is personally dealing with, but how easy would it be to wear a cool tie dye shirt once a week to remind others that whatever they're going through, your work family is here to support you and to let you know, YOU'RE NOT ALONE!

So, if you've got it, WEAR IT! If you don't have any tie-dye, why not get with the movement? You never know who's heart you may touch when they need it the most. Just the act of choosing a piece of tie-dye clothing once a week with purpose tells our work family, you matter and I care. Could there be five more powerful words in the English language?

It's a Total Eclipse of Head Start



And like any job, there some days that are more challenging than others, but it seems Ferrari is just taking it all in stride.




Chamness has been in her current role for 20+ years and prides herself on being a caregiver.
