Happy New Year Friends!



Then we move quickly onto screening and assessment work. We screen children for health needs, behavioral health needs, dental needs, sensory needs (vision and hearing) and developmental functioning. At the same time, we work with the parents in their homes to screen and assess the family for things they may need such as the stabilization of housing, medical needs, behavioral health needs, education or vocational needs and employment needs.

Then we move onto the next phase of the program year that we have been heavily engaged with recently, which is to design services and interventions to meet the needs of our children, with a goal of preparing them for kindergarten and life beyond Head Start.

Between now and the end of the school year, we will work with families to meet goals and deliver the critical services that children need in order to be school ready, and to help set the entire family up for success.

This may include classroom support, dental restoration, glasses, hearing aids and outside support from the vast network of community service providers whom we are fortunate enough to partner with.

Central to all of these things is you, our community and mission partners who support our work. While some of the services mentioned above are provided by our funding sources, many are not. Your support helps us to provide warm coats, corrective glasses, hearing supports where needed, dental restoration costs, safe sleep kits for our newborn learners and a myriad of other things that families need in order to thrive. Together, we make Head Start work in building stronger communities through compassion and lending a hand up.

## Villalobos Family Receives Habitat for Humanity Home

Prior to closing on their new Edwardsville home last November, the Villalobos family of six lived in a 930 squarefoot house.

"We were basically right on top of each other all the time," says **Kelly Villalobos**. "This means a lot to my family to have more space and more room for my kids to play and have their individual space. We're very excited, this means so much to us."

Kelly Villalobos has been a Head Start parent for several years now. She initially reached out to the agency when her youngest daughter was six months old.

"I noticed some delays she was having, including rolling over and things like that, so I got in touch with Head Start and they started coming to my house," she says. "My oldest daughter is now six years old. I also have a four-year-old attending Head Start for the second year. And I have two foster children who are developmentally disabled. Head Start has been amazing to my family, helping me with issues that we've had to face and obstacles we've had to overcome."

Villalobos found out about the Habitat for Humanity home from a flyer that was inside her daughter's cubicle at Edwardsville Head Start.

"That's when I went to the meeting and got all the paperwork," she says. "I applied and I was chosen out of all the other families that went for it. Without Head Start, I would not have known this option was available to my family."

The family closed on their new Edwardsville home on November 22, 2024 and was so thrilled to be in their new home just in time for the holidays.

"We were super excited to be able to be there for our first Christmas in our first home," she says. "It's great! I want to say a big thank you to the folks at Head Start for making the information available in order for us to have this opportunity."

Planning for the interactive playground began about five years ago, according to Center Supervisor **Sammie Neumeister**, but it was delayed due in part to the pandemic.

Construction on the playground began last May and was completed in August. Those companies that took part in the construction of the playground include **Spaces for Play** and **Greenup**, both located in northern Illinois.

Funding was provided in part by donations from **Rooted in Play**, the **Junior Service Club of Edwardsville/Glen Carbon**, and the **PNC Foundation**. The latter also took part in helping to beautify the playground by providing volunteers to help install childsafe plants in the yard.
